Importance of Latino Voters in Colorado

- Very tight race between incumbent Senator Mark Udall and Republican challenger Cory Gardner
- > 284,000 Latino registered voters in Colorado
- Latinos comprise 14% of the Colorado electorate
- In 2012 Latinos provided decisive margin of victory in presidential race.


- Polled Latino registered occasional voters in Colorado
- □ September 19 September 28, 2014
- \square N=400, MOE +/- 4.9 percentage points
- Interviews in English or Spanish, at their discretion by fully bilingual interviewers
- Blended sample of landline telephones, cell phones, and the Latino Decisions online web panel

Key Findings in Colorado

- The economy, immigration, and health care are foremost on the minds of Colorado's Latino electorate
- > A strong sense of community mobilizes this electorate
- Latinos perceive party outreach efforts to be lacking
- With 31% of Colorado's Latino electorate undecided in the close Senate race, candidates would be wise to engage on both message and turnout.


2014 ELECTION AND TURNOUT

Colorado Senate Race



Midterm Turnout Enthusiasm




2014 v. 2012 Enthusiasm








Ties to Undocumented Immigrants

48% of U.S. born


48% of English dominant







"There is a lot at stake in this election like jobs, education, health care and immigration - the only way we can make our community better is by voting." Would you say that message was...






Latino Perceptions of Democratic Party






Latino Perceptions of Republican Party




