


2018 Headlines

In the election for U.S. House of Representatives, did you vote for the Democratic candidate or Republican candidate?



























The Latino vote by age

What did we learn about 2018

- Continued investment in Latino communities has the greatest opportunity for <u>short</u>, <u>medium</u>, and <u>long-term</u> gains
- Texas saw the largest gains in Latino vote ever
- Latino & POC voters drove the "blue wave" in 2018
- Good candidates, voter registration drives, and continued investment in Latinos WILL make Texas a coveted swing state in the very near future.

What did we learn about 2018

- Continued investment in Latino communities has the greatest opportunity for <u>short</u>, <u>medium</u>, and <u>long-term</u> gains
- Texas saw the largest gains in Latino vote ever
- Latino & POC voters drove the "blue wave" in 2018
- Good candidates, voter registration drives, and continued investment in Latinos WILL make Texas a coveted swing state in the very near future. Once that happens, the electoral map is closed to GOP for a generation
 - Dems could lose FL, PA, NH, IA, MI, OH, NC, AZ and still win 277
