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Methodology

Latino Decisions surveyed a total of 657 Latino registered voters between June 29 – July 5, 2016. Interviews were conducted in English or Spanish, according to the respondent's choice. Surveys were completed using a blended sample that included online surveys (25%), and live telephone interviews (75%) on landlines and cell phones.
